Course Description

This course has in view the empowerment of the church in urban centers for mission and ministry. It recognizes the cultural, ethnic and social diversity of contemporary cities and the challenges this holds for effective witness and service. It is also mindful of the internal challenges facing the church with its religious consumer mentality, its lack of a corporate missional identity and its cultural captivity. At the same time, this course recognizes the missional identity of the church and its call to be the servant of God's Kingdom purposes. In order for this missional call to be strengthened and encouraged, this course seeks to develop a vision of the church rooted in Trinitarian and Kingdom theology. From this starting point, the course explores models of the church, strategies for effective witness and service, themes in holistic mission, and the contours of a missional spirituality. These themes are explored within the setting of the challenges, problems and possibilities of our urban environments.

Course Objectives:

- 1) Situate the church and its mission in Trinitarian and Kingdom theology.
- 2) Understand key dimensions of our urban and multi-cultural world and the challenges these pose for the church in mission.
- 3) Explore the dimensions of holistic mission and ministry and the empowerment of the whole people of God for witness and service.
- 4) Understand different models of effective missional churches and key strategies for evangelism and service.
- 5) Reflect on the missional strategies of key churches in the Greater Vancouver area.

- 6) Develop a strategy for empowering the church for witness and service.

#### Course Options

In order to make this course as adaptable as possible to the specific settings in which students find themselves, students are invited to choose one of three different tracks.

##### *Track One – Leadership*

This track is designed for church leadership teams who are taking the course together. (It is only necessary for one person to be taking the course for credit.) This is an ideal setting for taking the course as it provides a ready-made discussion group. The group will meet regularly during the study period to discuss and report on issues raised by the lectures. Discussion group materials will be provided.

##### *Track Two – Group*

This track is designed for students who are able to meet with others taking the course, or form their own discussion group. (It is only necessary for one person to be taking the course for credit.) Taking the course in a small group setting such as this is highly recommended. As with Track One, the group will meet regularly during the study period to discuss and report on issues raised by the lectures. Discussion group materials will be provided.

##### *Track Three – Online*

This track is designed for students who, while unable to meet with others in person, are able to take the course alongside others online. In this track students will participate in online forums, discussing the issues raised by the course on a variety of bulletin boards. Additionally, they will develop their ideas about church renewal, based on their reading and discussion, in a reflection paper.

**1. Reading.**

Students in all tracks are to read 800 pages from the bibliography. (See below for details.)

**2. Research Paper.**

Students in all tracks are required to write a research paper on a theology of the church in mission and evangelism. At least two books from the Primary Textbooks section (I) and four books from the Secondary Recommended Books (II) must be drawn upon for the research paper. Depending on the specific themes of your paper these may be supplemented by books in the Additional Bibliography (III). While the focus of the paper is the development of a theological perspective, the paper must conclude with practical implications.

The length of this paper is 3,000 words.

### **3. Group Discussion.**

Students in tracks one and two only are to meet with their discussion groups for a total of at least 15 hours. Individual discussion group meetings should be at least one hour in length. Discussion groups must include at least three people (including those registered for credit). Discussion group materials will be provided and may be copied for the use of group members. Students will also be supplied with a printed sheet on which to keep a record of their group meetings, to be submitted with outer course papers.

### **4. Group Report.**

Students in tracks one and two only are to write a paper outlining the issues raised in their discussion groups. The paper is to focus on the practical ways in which the course can be implemented in the student's own situation. What were the themes with which the group wrestled? Were there areas of disagreement and how were these resolved? What key themes for your own situation emerged? How did the group feel that application of the lectures and reading could be made to real situations? The length of this paper is 3,000 words.

### **5. Online Discussion.**

Students in track three only must contribute to the Empowering the Church Online Forum. (See Online Forums handout for instructions on using the course web site.) The purpose of the online forum is to promote genuine discussion of the issues, so students are encouraged to contribute to the notice boards freely, asking questions, raising issues, responding to one another, etc, as briefly or extensively as they wish. Nevertheless, students must post at least six responses of over 200 words, distributed over at least two different discussion boards.

**Please print hard copies of your six responses of over 200 words and submit them with your other papers.**

### **6. Reflection Paper.**

Students in track three only must write a reflection paper outlining a practical process by which a local church may renew its (i) theological vision, (ii) church identity and (iii) missional strategies.

The length of this paper is 3,000 words.
